Martyrology: St Norbert was born in Germany in 1080. In his youth he pursued a life dedicated to bodily pleasures, although he had been ordained a subdeacon due to his family's influence, a task that required him to recite the Divine Office in the church in Xanten. He paid someone to do this for him, since he had gained a more lucrative position as the chaplain to Emperor Henry V. In about 1115 he had a riding accident in a storm, and a conversion experience, which completely changed his life and he then became a priest, dedicating himself to preaching. He was a charismatic figure and others soon came to join him, although his asceticism was so extreme at the start that his first three companions died. At the Council of Rheims in 1119 Pope Calixtus II asked him to begin a new Order the Premonstratensian Order, following the Rule of



St Augustine. He later became Bishop of Magdeburg, in Germany, and died in 1134.
